Where did the Trinity Doctrine come from?

Several hundred years after the Apostle Paul lived, the Catholic institution came up with the 'Nicene' and 'Athanasian Creeds' which <u>forced</u> believers to accept the unscriptural 'Trinity Doctrine' or face condemnation, excommunication and worse. These Catholic Creeds <u>condemned all non-Trinitarian</u> <u>people!</u> Because of these 'creeds,' multitudes of people <u>were tortured and put to death!</u> And for what reason? Because these believers held on to their belief that, "Yahweh is a <u>singular One"</u> ...not <u>three</u>. This fact alone should have 'sounded the alarm' in the Christian world concerning this false doctrine!

What about the Protestant Church?

"At the time of the Reformation, the Protestant Church took over the doctrine of the Trinity, without serious examination."

Trinitarians teach people to worship and pray to 'three persons'

Here is an exact quote from a 'Trinitarian' website:

"So our one God is present in three persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. This is the doctrine of the Trinity. It is appropriate to worship all three, and we should be careful to ensure that our worship of one person of the Trinity does not overshadow our worship of any other person of the Trinity."

The Catholic Pope Francis, told people on January 11, 2015...

"We usually <u>pray to Jesus</u>," Francis said. "When we pray the 'Our Father,' we <u>pray to the Father</u>. But we don't pray so much to the Holy Spirit. It is so important to <u>pray to the Holy Spirit</u>," he said.

Today, <u>both</u> Catholics and Protestants teach their followers they should <u>worship</u> and <u>pray</u> to '<u>three</u> <u>distinct persons</u> whom are <u>Each</u> fully God'! This is totally unscriptural and unbiblical.

Why using <u>His name</u> 'YAH-shua' and not the term 'God' is important

When we Believers, lift up and proclaim the name Yahshua, we are proclaiming allot! Not only in the eyes of our Savior, but to all the world around us! We are specifically, and correctly, identifying the one true Almighty Father of scripture.

When a person uses the name Yahshua, (YAH is salvation) they are proclaiming what that name means, that YAH, The Almighty Father, is our Savior who was manifested in flesh to die for our sins.

Sadly, when people use the **generic term 'god'**, they are completely **eliminating The Fathers name** and the glory due **Him** as being our Savior. Furthermore, **they are using the same generic term 'god'** used by false religions around the world when speaking of **their deities**.

Believer, like David, Isaiah, and those in Heaven, let us call our Father and Savior by His Name and not by the unscriptural and generic term 'God'. Let us lift up and glorify the only Savior; The Almighty Father manifested in flesh, Yahshua Messiah.

The Almighty Father manifested Himself in flesh as a man, to do for us what we could NEVER do for ourselves. He fulfilled the demands of the Law as a perfect man of flesh, so that He could be our perfect sacrifice, 'kinsman redeemer' and Savior!

On the cross <u>He</u> took <u>ALL</u> of our sins (past, present and future) and put them upon <u>Himself</u>, paying <u>our</u> price and thereby making us "holy, blameless" and "without a single fault" in His eyes. (Colossians 1:22)

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People call Him 'God' because they don't know His name

Question: Why do Christians, even Pastors, use the term 'God'?

The first reason is because The Almighty Father's name was removed from the Bible 6,828 times and replaced with the word 'God'. The word 'God' is a 'term', it is not a name.

The <u>elimination</u> of The Almighty Father's name and replacing it with the unscriptural and generic term 'God', is so strange and demonic that it brings to mind the words of the Apostle Paul,

"For we are not fighting against flesh-and-blood enemies, but against evil rulers and authorities of the unseen world, against mighty powers in this dark world, and against evil spirits in the heavenly places." Ephesians 6:12

"To <u>remove</u> the name is to <u>extinguish</u> the person"

"In the Scriptures there is the closest possible relationship between a person and his name, the two being practically equivalent, so that to remove the name is to extinguish the person."

Zondervan Pictorial Bible Dictionary p. 571 (1964)

The second reason is due the advent of the 'Trinity Doctrine'. The Trinity Doctrine was established by the Roman Catholic church at the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D..

Refuting the words of The Almighty Himself, Trinitarians proclaimed that The Almighty is **not** a **singular One**, but is instead one being comprised of 'THREE distinct persons **EACH** fully God'.

'God', 'LORD', 'Lord'

You may be surprised to learn that the words 'God', 'LORD', and 'Lord', are not Scriptural words at all.

The King James translators erred in translating the Old Testament Hebrew word 'Elohim', and the New Testament Greek word 'Theos'. Both of these words mean, 'Mighty One' in English, however, the translators incorrectly used the unscriptural and pagan word 'God' instead.

Look at the meaning of the word 'God' according to these three sources:

The Encyclopedia Britannica
The Encyclopedia of Religion and Ethics
The Webster's Twentieth Century Dictionary

'GOD' is the common Teutonic word for a personal object of religious worship, applied to all the superhuman beings of the heathen mythologies, and various kinds of idols.

The King James translators made another translation error regarding the <u>name</u> of the Almighty. They <u>changed</u> the name "Yahweh", to the Anglo-Saxon word, 'LORD'.

According to 'New Unger's Bible Dictionary', the word 'LORD' that we see in the Old Testament, should have been translated as Yahweh.

Unger's states regarding this translation error:

"Yahweh... This is used as a proper name of the Almighty and <u>should have been retained</u> in that form by the translators."

Furthermore, 'Kyrios' or 'kurios' is a Greek word that is usually translated as "lord" or "master".

It is used in the Septuagint translation of the Hebrew Bible about 7000 times in translating the name 'Yahweh'. It appears in the Koine Greek New Testament about 740 times, usually referring to Jesus (Yahshua).

What is The Almighty Fathers Name?

King David tells us plainly in Psalm 68:4 that The Almighty Fathers name is **YAH**. David writes:

"Sing to God, sing praises to His name; Extol Him who rides on the clouds, By His name YAH, and rejoice before Him."

The Almighty Fathers name is **YAH** in the Old Testament but, does The Almighty Father, as Savior, still have the name **YAH** in the *New Testament? YES!* In the Old Testament, when you see '**LORD**', it is **actually** The Almighty Fathers name **Yahweh**. YAH-WEH is a **compound name**, meaning The Almighty Fathers name **YAH**, is combined with a 'descriptor'. The descriptor is the word '**weh**', which means, 'The Self-Existent one' (I AM). So, the name **YAH**-weh means: '**YAH** - The Self-Existent one'.

YAH, waited to give us His <u>highest</u> name until <u>He</u> came to us <u>Himself</u> in the <u>New</u> Testament! YAH, now combines His name with <u>His highest</u> 'descriptor'. This descriptor is the Hebrew word 'shua', which means "<u>is salvation</u>". When you combine The Almighty Fathers name YAH, with 'shua', (YAH-shua) it means, "YAH is salvation"!

The Almighty Father proclaims *His <u>highest</u> name to us* as *Savior!* This is why 'Yahshua' "is the name which is above every name"! (Philippians 2:9)

The Trinity Doctrine and it's harmful effects

Contrary to scripture, the 'Trinity Doctrine' teaches that the Almighty is <u>not</u> ONE person, but that He is one being comprised of '<u>three persons</u>'. People naturally find it difficult, *(if not impossible)* to relate to a 'three person' being. Honestly, who can understand or relate to <u>one</u> being with '<u>three persons</u>' in it? *No one!*

When the 'Trinity Doctrine' came... *confusion came*. Trinitarians were confused about <u>which person</u> they should pray to; and <u>what</u> was <u>His singular name</u> since He was comprised of 'three' persons?

This 'Doctrine' created a major problem for Trinitarians regarding The Almighty's name, for if The Almighty is comprised of 'three distinct persons', (as Trinitarian paintings portray), what then is The Almighty's SINGULAR NAME?

Understandably, they were perplexed asking, "What is His singular name if He is comprised of 'three distinct persons'?

For example, if <u>all three</u> of these 'persons' were gathered together, (as they are often portrayed in Trinitarian paintings), <u>what would His singular name be?</u>



The answer to their dilemma was found by using the generic term 'God' for their 'three person deity'.

By using the term 'God', His true name was no longer necessary. Problem solved; therefore popularizing the term whilst leaving The Almighty One's true name behind.

Regrettably, most Trinitarian pastors, teachers and believers have simply resorted to using the common and 'generic' term 'God' in place of His true, Holy, and 'Heaven sent' Name.

Because of this confusion, <u>His name</u> 'YAH-shua' is seldom, if ever used and has been <u>replaced</u> by the generic term 'God'.
